Developing A Cultural Humility

Cultural is one construct for understanding and developing a process-oriented approach to competency. J.N. Hook, the psychologist conceptualized cultural humility as the ability to maintain an interpersonal stance that is other-oriented or open to the other in relation to aspects of cultural identity that are most important to the (individual or person). It means uncovering the ways in which that cultural inheritance impacts how we see ourselves and relate to others. Also, it is about looking deeper and discovering the complexity of our cultural inheritance, the values, we learned about ourselves and others, too. In addition, it is discovering what we have internalized and embodied from our families, origins, growth, development, cultural traditions, social identities, life circumstances, social background, and the ways to defuse tensions.

More than a concept, cultural humility is a communal reflection to analyse the root causes of suffering and create a broader including a more inclusive view of the world.

Originally, Doctors Melanie Tervalon and Murray-Gracia in 1998 developed this concept in medicine to address health disparities and institutional inequities. Cultural humility is widely used in public health, social work, education, and non-profit management. It is a daily practice for people to deal with hierarchical relationships, changing organizational policy and building relationships based on trust. The attributes are openness, self-awareness, egoless, supportive interactions, and self-reflection and critique. The antecedents are diversity and power imbalance. The consequences are mutual empowerment, partnerships, respect, optimal care, and lifelong learning.

There are three factors for a sojourner guidance toward cultural humility as follows:

1. It is a lifelong commitment to self-evaluation and self- critique according to Doctors Melanie Tervalon and Jann Murray-Garcia. The knowledge of such concept gives us an unending learning and crave for more. We must be humble and flexible. At the same time, be bold enough to see ourselves critically with a desire to learn more and more. When we fail to know something, we must be able to acknowledge that. Understanding is only as powerful as the action that follows.
2. It is a desire to fix power imbalance where nothing is ought to exist. Recognizing that an individual would bring something different to the proverbial table of life helps us to see the value of the individual. Take for an example A and B conversation. When A holds the power in scientific knowledge and B, an expert on his own life, character, symptoms and strengths (in personal history and preferences), Here, both A and B must collaborate and from each other for the best solutional outcome.
3. It is aspirational to develop partnership with people or groups who advocate for others. Although individuals can create positive change; communities and groups can also have a profound impact on systems. It is not appropriate for individual to commit self-evaluation and fixing power imbalances without advocating within the larger organisations in which we participate.

In conclusion, cultural humility is a lifelong journey of self-awareness and self-reflection. It is no easy means to practice this kind of awareness without first considering the basic groundwork that is infused with caring warmth. It is indeed larger than our individual selves – we must advocate for it systemically.

The BPCA (Buddhist and Pali College Alumni)

During the time of the Buddha, there were pavilions and open areas in public places where a religious teacher can go to for debate or to preach their philosophies. Dhamma was being spread literally anywhere, and at any time.

You do not have to pay anything to listen to these public forums. The Dhamma should be free for all who seek the truth.

Our world today is very different. Advertising, organising a preview, getting students to settled down, all have a cost to it. Luckily we have activities where generous donors help to defray the cost for the purpose of introducing people to the Dhamma path. But even though the Course is free at Buddhist and Pali College, we still need to pay for the facilities, such as Air-con room, a place to gather and call our class. It is the kind generosity of Mangala Vihara to offer us their classrooms, but nevertheless, we had to contribute to their maintenance of these classes, which is \$20 per month, or \$240 per year. A meagre sum for the knowledge we gain. And also the cost of registration and exams have to be borne by the students. But, the course is free.

We are very dependent on Volunteers to run this organisation. The Admin Officer, the Teachers and an Alumni consisting of past and present students. Traditionally, an Alumni is separate from the school but our Alumni have much in common with the objectives of the school and so the Alumni does it's part to 'volunteer' to the needs of the College. The Alumni have a term of 2 years, thereafter, they will be up for renewal soon.

If you believe that you can do something for our Buddhist community then come forward to serve in the BPC Alumni. The Alumni support regular programs such as Introduction to Buddhism Course, Taichi, Chinese New Year Gathering, Holy Pilgrimage Tour, Diploma Preview, Diploma Orientation, and Ad-hoc programs as and when proposed by the members. Come and talk to our committee members or contact our Principal and Vice Principal directly.
