Buddhist and Pali College of Singapore rejoices in turning the Dhamma wheel for the past 30 years

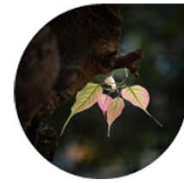

11 – 20 August 2023

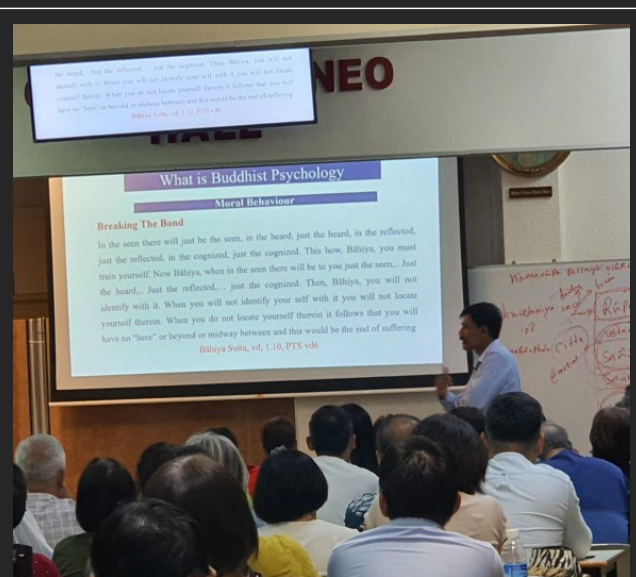
About the Course

Special attention is paid to the therapeutic values of Insight and Tranquility meditation.

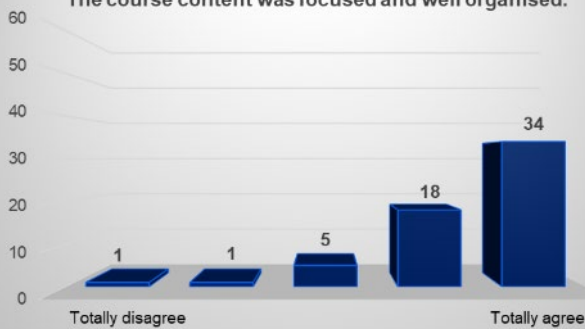
Snap Shots of Role Play

- Students acting as “clients” and “counsellors”, where counsellors tried to find out what were the underlying issues facing the clients, analysed the issues and proposed a treatment approach.

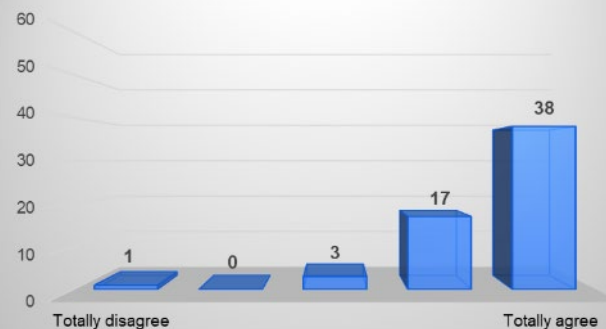

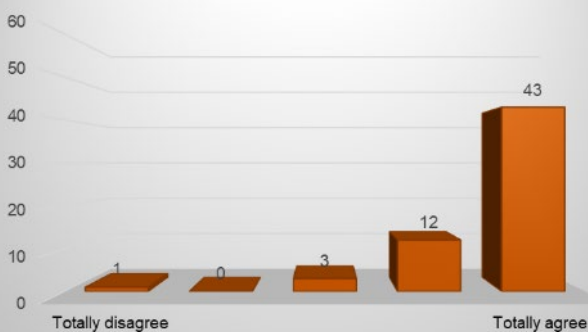

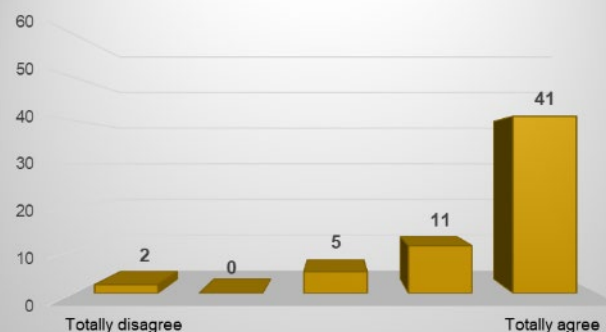

30 Years & Counting: BPC 30th Anniversary Symposium - *Sammodanā*

The year 2023 witnesses the Buddhist and Pali College of Singapore (BPC) reaching a new milestone. A symposium was held on 9 September 2023 at the SingPost Centre Auditorium to commemorate this significant point in the College's history. The theme, *Sammodanā*, was chosen for the 30th Anniversary celebrations. *Sammodanā* (Pali), translates into English as "Rejoicing" to reflect both the jubilation of Singapore's emergence from the Covid-19 pandemic and the College's 30th years in providing Buddhist education and propagating the Dhamma in Singapore.

An organising committee, comprising members from the BPC Alumni (BPCA) Committee and lecturers started work 6 months ahead of time to assemble the programme. BPC lecturer and a practising architect, Bro Ong Keng



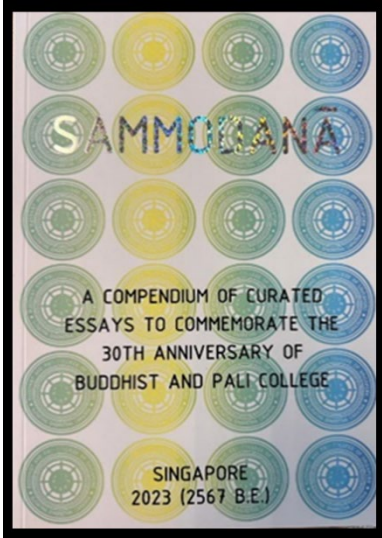
Boon, designed the logo for the event, and in his own words, "with the numbers three and zero infilled with an explosion of colours, they emulate a sense of great joy, happiness and delight. The number zero was also purposefully infilled with the Asoka Dhammacakka signifying BPC's efforts in turning the wheel of Dhamma for the past 30 years".

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The vibrant logo naturally went onto all symposium memorabilia, such as the t-shirt, tote bag, notebook, lanyard, etc. “The 30th Anniversary commemorative book was also deliberately printed with flashy and an almost ostentatious word *Sammōdanā* on the cover to echo the sense of great joy, happiness and delight”, said Bro Keng Boon.



The symposium guests of honour were Ven Professor Neluwe Sumanawansa Nayaka Thero, Vice Chancellor, Buddhist and Pali University of Sri Lanka and Mr U Ahmed Razee, Acting High Commissioner of Sri Lanka to Singapore. Other invited guests included members of the sangha, lecturers from BPC, guests from Buddhists organizations, past and current students of BPC.



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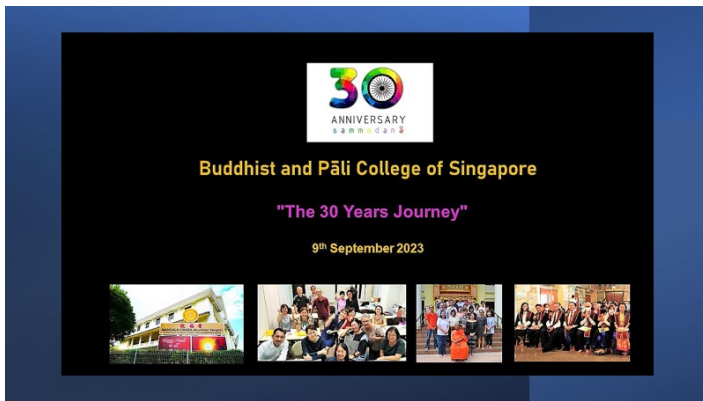

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Four speakers, representing the 4 communities of Buddhism of monks, nuns, layman and laywoman, gave their own precious interpretation of the theme, *Sammodanā*.

Sis Sylvia Bay, our very own BPC alumnus, spoke about “Timely Reflection and Right Practice”. She viewed the pandemic as a “timely reminder of life’s fragility and uncertainty” and cautioned that as we “rejoice in our resilience in surviving the worst of COVID ravages, we should take this opportunity of a second chance at life to reflect and grow in Dhamma understanding, to consolidate our practice and be kinder and better versions of ourselves, and to live even more meaningfully in service of the Triple Gem”.



Dr Tony See, who lectures in Philosophy of Religion and Continental Philosophy at the NTU gave his thoughts on “How to be Happy? Buddhist Perspectives”. He advised the audience on how to live meaningfully going forward, with profound joy and happiness, based on the practice of mindfulness.



Ven Tenzin Tsultrim, from the Vajrayana tradition and a Dhamma teacher with the Amitabha Buddhist Centre, shared on “No Unchanging Sorrow, No Uncreated Joy”. She reiterated the Buddhist teachings that “the mind holds the most powerful potential to transform all problems if one trains it well” and that this power of “transformation is available to everyone if we know how”.

Ven K. Rathanasara, founder and Spiritual Advisor of the Dhammakami Buddhist Society in Singapore, spoke about “Rejoicing, Peace, and Well-being”. He stressed that the “understanding of the Four Noble Truths leads to the development of rejoicing to the highest sense of the word which helps one to cultivate this virtue even under unfavourable social and economic conditions, and lead on the Noble Path of spiritual perfection”.



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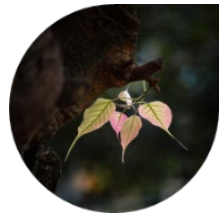


Punctuating the time between the 4 thought-provoking speeches and the Q&A sessions were some thoughtful line-up of items: a vegetarian buffet lunch for guests, teaching staff, past and present students to reconnect over food, drinks and desserts; a silent auction showcased Bhante M. Suneetha's photography of Buddhist images from Sri Lanka, Hongkong and Laos and also gave art lovers the opportunity to adopt the images through donations to help defray the cost of the event; a delightful ukelele performance by students from the METTA School featured nostalgic songs and it was heartwarming as we listened to "Lean on Me" and "You Have a Friend in Me" among noble friends.

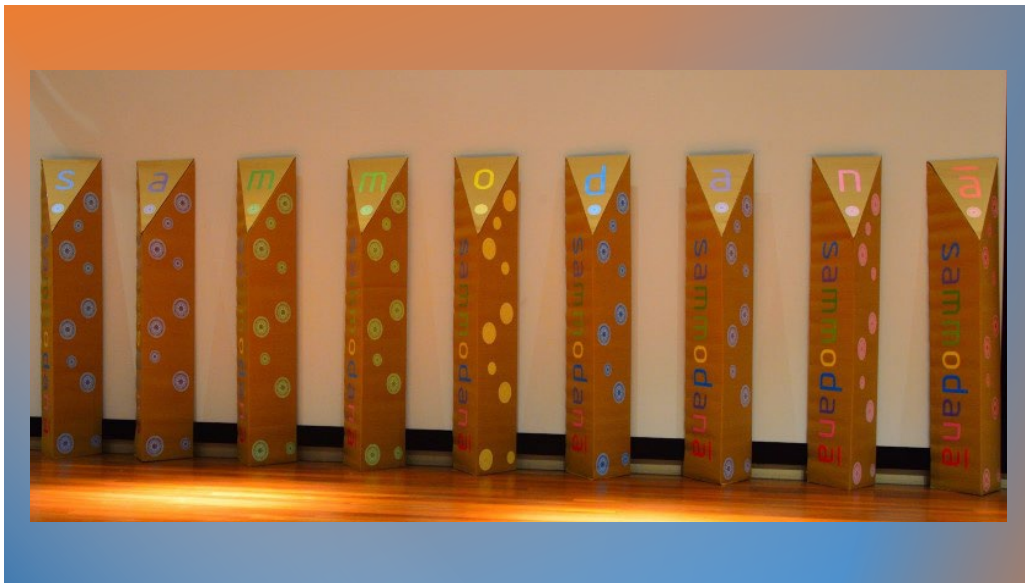
